

Celebrating 50 Years with Founding Board Member Doris Brineman

Throughout this year, the Bloomington Hospital Foundation has celebrated 50 years of local impact on healthcare in the community. Now a robust fundraising arm for local healthcare, the Foundation's beginnings are rich in history – particularly women's history.

In 1897, several women in Bloomington put a call out to the various women's groups in town suggesting they band together to share communications and to promote work of common interests. They organized a Local Council of Women (LCW) with a goal of improving the city.

Flash forward to some point in the early 1950s, when the LCW's mission turned from broad community overview to the hospital, solely. In 1965, the Hospital Foundation was established, and in 1967, the Bloomington Hospital Foundation was incorporated, centralizing the work of fundraising that had previously been undertaken by LCW committees.

With the creation of the Foundation, there was also a creation of a first Board of Directors. Serving on that founding board was Doris Brineman,

one of only two founding members still living. "I came to serve on the board because of my involvement with the LCW," explained Doris. "Good healthcare was important to me and to Bloomington. There were about a dozen of us on that first board. We were a pretty congenial group who realized how important our Foundation could be to the hospital."

According to Doris, Foundation fundraising started off rather slowly. "We spent our time trying to convince people that giving money to the Foundation was a good way to honor or memorialize a loved one," she said. "That was our main source of income."

But then they "got serious about it" and hired the Foundation's first employee. Their goal was to begin deliberately raising money for hospital projects. They threw their first "hospital ball" at College Mall. "They draped all the storefronts and there was a big stage in front of Sears. It was quite an undertaking," Doris reminisced. "Eventually that led to the Festival of Trees which in turn became the annual Gala."

While serving on the Foundation board, Doris also found herself working as a hospital employee. Prior to her board position, she became the hospital's first Public Relations Director in 1961. She wrote articles, took photos of the hospital being built, and eventually put out the hospital's first newsletter. "Inside."

"My role as PR Director and board member went hand-in-hand," Doris said. "They really fit together nicely."

Sometime over the years - Doris doesn't exactly recall when - she exited the Foundation's board. "It had been many years, and it was just time," she said. Doris continued to work at the hospital until her retirement in 1981. But she just couldn't stay away. Later that year she began serving as a volunteer. On December 14 of this year, after 36 years of volunteering, Doris served her last volunteer shift. "I've just loved helping people. I'll miss that the most."

When asked what she thought of Bloomington Hospital Foundation celebrating its 50th anniversary, she said, "It's wonderful, just wonderful. And I'm especially happy that they are still raising funds that stay right here in Bloomington. The hospital gives excellent care, and I have high hopes that healthcare will continue to be outstanding in this community."

Doris summed up, "One person could never accomplish so much. It takes a group - and the Foundation and its supporters have been a great group over these 50 years."

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

2017 CRIB FOR EVERY BABY CAMPAIGN

IU Health Safe Sleep Program



Unfortunately, more than 3,400 babies in the United States die from sleep-related deaths each year. In fact, sleep-related deaths are the #1 cause of death for infants between one month and one year old. Studies show that many of these deaths are caused by accidental suffocation due to <u>unsafe sleeping environments</u>.

The IU Health Bloomington Safe Sleep Program provides portable cribs – sometimes referred to as a "pack-n-play" – to families of infants who cannot otherwise afford a crib. In order to receive a crib free of charge, parents must first participate in a Safe Sleep education class where they learn the importance of practicing safe sleeping habits for their infant.


In the first half of 2017, more than 250 portable cribs were distributed.

Unfortunately, funding for the program is dwindling while demand for the cribs is at an all-time high and requests continue to rise.

Bloomington Hospital Foundation's 2017 Crib for Every Baby Campaign looks to fund the purchase of portable cribs for this most vulnerable portion of our population. This \$110,000 campaign will fund the purchase of 500 cribs per year for the next five years and will also help educate parents on the importance of safe sleeping habits.

- ➤ 7.3 per 1,000: Indiana's infant mortality rate
- ► 5.8 per 1,000: United States' infant mortality rate
- ► 75% of Bloomington's singlemoms-as-head-of-household are living in poverty
- ► 44% of infants born at IU Health Bloomington Hospital in 2015 were Medicaid/charity care/no insurance
- According to a local survey, the second-highest-rated health issue in our community is the need for Sudden Infant Death Syndrome education and training
- ► Each year nearly 50 Hoosier infants die due to unintentional suffocation that's enough children to fill two Kindergarten classrooms
