New Beds Offer Improved Comfort at IU Health Hospice House

The Bloomington Hospital Foundation recently allocated nearly \$70,000 for the purchase of ten new patient beds at IU Health Hospice House. The beds offer improved comfort and safety to patients at the end of life's journey. IU Health Hospice and Hospice House Clinical Operations Manager Heather Varga, RN, sent the Foundation this note as an update:

Good morning!

The new Hillrom beds are amazing! We have been able to weigh our hospice patients with little effort and no discomfort to our patients. The beds are very easy to move around the room or wheel out onto the deck if the patient wishes.

The built in bed-exit alarms keep our patients safer. We are currently conducting a study and gathering data that will prove these beds help reduce patient falls. One RN said she really loved the fact that she can tell if the bed exit alarm is on just by walking by the room – there is a green light that glows under the bed when the alarm is on.

Lastly, the ability to convert each bed to a low air-loss mattress, to reduce pressure, has been wonderful for maintaining the skin integrity of our very fragile patients. We are very pleased with the beds and could not be more grateful!

Ted Jackson Named Roland E. "Bud" Kohr Outstanding Leadership Award Winner

In May of 2008, the Roland E. "Bud" Kohr Outstanding Leadership Award was established through the Bloomington Hospital Foundation as a way to honor Kohr's dedication to the local community. Kohr spent 40 years in health care, including nearly 29 years as President of Bloomington Hospital. The award provides an annual award and stipend for an outstanding employee who is a member of the hospital's Leadership Group.

Bud Kohr passed away in 2015, but his efforts to support outstanding leaders lives on through the Foundation. The award's selection criteria includes such qualities as honesty, integrity, ethical behavior, moral behavior, fairness, trust, and behavior that would serve as a role model to other leaders or would-be leaders.

One such leader, who was recently named the award winner in December of 2016, is Ted Jackson, MBA, RRT, Director of Pulmonary and Radiology Services for IU Health Bloomington Hospital.

"I've been at the hospital for 27 years, so Bud and I knew each other through work," Jackson said. "It meant a lot to me to be nominated for this award. To be nominated by peers is the most rewarding aspect, though."

Coworkers Michele Ridge and Kathy Bennett nominated Jackson for the award speaking to his dedication to servant leadership, trust and commitment, and support of team members.

Jackson has and continues to make a positive impact on the lives of others. With his award from the Bloomington Hospital Foundation, he plans to further that impact by completing the Certified Radiology Administrator credentialing exam through the Association for Medical Imaging Management.

Prior to his passing, when asked what the most important trait for the award is, Kohr shared, "Good character, good character, and good character." The Bloomington Hospital Foundation is confident that Kohr would have been proud of 2016 award winner Ted Jackson.

IU HEALTH CHILDREN'S THERAPY CENTER

2017 Assisted Technology and Mobility Initiative

In 2016, the IU Health Children's Therapy Center celebrated its 25th anniversary of assisting local children. The Children's Therapy Center has served more than 12,000 children, providing physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy and social services.

The center is accredited as a Pediatric Specialty Program by the Commission for Accreditation of Rehab Facilities and is the only program in the state of Indiana to hold this important accreditation.

With a focus on family-centered care, the IU Health Children's Therapy Center is proud to offer a wide range of specialty services and skills thanks to the purchase of needed equipment and the offering of staff training and education that is supported by donations to the center through the Bloomington Hospital Foundation.

The 2017 Assisted Technology and Mobility Initiative

will further help the center in its dedication to play-based treatment sessions where family members are encouraged to actively participate in an effort to promote carry-over into home, school and community environments. In short, these items will have a vast impact on the lives of the children using them.

IU Health Children's Therapy Center:

- They serve children and adolescents from birth to 21 years of age.
- They focus on family-centered care and make every effort to involve all members of a patient's family into therapy and care.
- In 2015, the center served well over 1,000 patients with a total of 16,641 visits.
- Children travel from more than 12 south central Indiana counties to receive care.
- Currently, over half of the patient population comes from a low-income household.
- The 2016 follow-up discharge calls indicated that 98.3% of children from the program found it easier to participate in home, school and community activities post-discharge.



Your support of the 2017 Assisted Technology and Mobility Initiative will help provide:

- High-tech assisted-communication devices for non-verbal children
- An eye-based tracking system so non-verbal children who struggle to control their extremities may "push" buttons on the communication device with their eye movement
- ▶ iPads with special apps for assisting with communication
- iPads with distinctive occupational therapy apps for assisting with fine motor and writing skills and dictation apps to help with school work
- Adaptive equipment for the above communication devices
- An Interactive Metronome that assists children with attention disorders using research-based training in the areas of attention, memory and coordination
- Biofeedback equipment including two high-tech devices called Bioness that help children with neurological conditions to walk more naturally
- Additional biofeedback equipment that will specifically be used to uniquely aid children who are struggling with incontinence
- Adaptive seating devices to improve sitting posture and/or postural control in mobility-impaired children
- ► Therapeutic foam balance beam and stepping stones
- Activity trackers
- Shading "sails" for Exploration Island so that the playground may be used even on the most scorching summer days!
